### To Reduce **Local** VMT




- Better/safer bike infrastructure

# TRANSPORTATION WORKSHOP RESULTS



### To Reduce **Regional** VMT



- Better light rail connections
- Standardized parking rates at regional stations
- Providing more regional jobs and entertainment
- Reducing employer transportation demand (e.g., flexible work schedule, transit passes)





Assign preliminary characteristics of sites through the draft Character of Change Map

#### **Develop Alternatives**

Consider all data gathered to date

#### **Select Preferred Alternative**

After a qualitative comparison of the alternatives



# LAND USE DESIGNATIONS

- Current General Plan includes nearly 25 land use designations
- Staff is investigating possible changes to this system that would describe areas by their character (e.g., residential neighborhood) rather than use
- Could lead to expansion of the Community Plan system (e.g., SEPA)
- More will be presented at the April meeting


# CONCEPT OF A GENERAL PLAN PLANNING AREA

- Each city shall adopt a comprehensive, long-term general plan for the physical development of the city, and of any land outside its boundaries which in the city's judgment bears relation to its planning (GC §65300)
- Larger than a sphere of influence (SOI), which is the probable physical boundaries and service area of a local agency, as determined by the Local Agency Formation Commission of the county




# 2003 STUDY AREA

- 2003 General Plan includes a "Study Area" that goes beyond existing City limits
- Includes area both inside and beyond the Sacramento County Urban Growth Area
- Does not include a land plan for the area beyond the City limits
- 2008/2013 SOI Amendment looked at a smaller area




# 2016 DRAFT PLANNING AREA

- Based upon 2013 SOI
   Amendment application
- Is a reduction from the 2003 Study Area
- Similar in some ways to SACOG Blueprint and 2016 MTP Land Plan
- Council will select final boundaries later in process (June)



# **IDENTIFYING OPPORTUNITY SITES**

- Based on background research, economic development priorities, and staff recommendations
- Includes active City-sponsored development projects
- Both infill development sites and potential future growth areas
- Most likely locations for future land use change
  - Consider alternative uses at April PC/CC session
  - Confirm preferred alternative at June PC/CC session



#### **Preserve**

- Preserve existing character and form
- No land use changes envisioned

#### Enhance

- Reinvest in existing developed areas
- Land use changes possible, but unlikely
- Modifications to the built environment are anticipated
- Accomplished through
  - General Plan policies
  - implementing codes and guidelines

# **Transform**

- Transform vacant infill opportunity sites and identify future growth areas
- Substantive land use changes anticipated
- Alternatives to be considered for all sites

# Transform + Prior Planned

Transform by finishing prior plans and ongoing projects


## Sites Identified Through Community Engagement

#### **Recommended by Staff**

- North and south side of Laguna Boulevard, west of SR 99
- Southeast corner of Sheldon and Elk Grove Florin Road
- Blue Line Corridor along Big Horn Boulevard


#### Additional Sites for PC/CC Consideration
